BEGIN AT THE BEGINNING

Casson Memorial lectures

- Started in 1973
- Commemorates Dr Elizabeth Casson, one of the pioneers of occupational therapy who opened the first school of occupational therapy in the UK, Dorset House, in 1930.
- It has become an annual event
 - AOTA Eleanor Clarke Slagle Lecture
 - CAOT Muriel Drive Memorial Lecture.
- Prestigious.



CRITERIA FOR NOMINATION:

- Inspirational
- Excellent communicator
- Made a significant contribution
- Member of COT in good standing;
- Demonstrated use of advanced theory, standards and methods within occupational therapy
- Improved outcomes for service users and carers
- Promotes public awareness and understanding of the profession's contribution.



INSTRUCTIONS!

- to reflect on the past, present and, especially, the future of occupational therapy;
- to consider national and international influences on the profession.

2014 adds:

- to challenge the profession,
- highlight innovation in practice, education and research,
- to stimulate debate about future directions in occupational therapy.





METHODOLOGY OF THE REVIEW

- To read all the available papers
 - Sadly Sir Hugh Casson's lecture in 1974 was not saved, nor Prof. Heinz Wolff's from 1984









METHOD (CONT.)

- To form a framework of coding for ideas and themes that emerged, repeated and resonated as the years unfolded.
 - No 'critical appraisal'- each lecture was an individual's approach to 'saying something' to the profession.
- Considered the lectures within their context the prevailing ideas and assumptions of the time. Including language.....



REFLECTION

-on my personal journey as an OT, including
 - > People I had met, knew and worked with
 - > Own roles:
 - OT
 - Educator
 - Researcher
 - R&D Board member and Chair
 - COT Council member and Chair
- So a personal interpretation both as participant and 'insider'.



CASSON LECTURERS

Having told you about what exacting criteria there are for the nominations...

Who ARE the Casson lecturers?

- In the early years, apart from Sir Hugh Casson, the speakers were largely from the medical profession.
- First OT as Casson lecturer in 1978: Alicia Mendez.
- 1980 & 1981 2 OTs.....
- From 1982 1986 : 4 medical Drs
- Only since 1987 have all the Casson lecturers been OTs.



1ST CASSON LECTURER

Sir George Godber – Medical officer at the Ministry of Health in the 1940's, Chief Medical Officer 1960-73

OT CASSON LECTURERS

- From 1987, the OT's giving the Casson lecturers, have overwhelmingly been academics and researchers:
 - 18 academics and researchers
 - 3 AHP Dept of Health / government officers
 - 4 clinicians
 - > 1 COT officer
- (2 lectures not given due to ill health)
- This lecturer profile begs many questions.....



THE AUDIENCE?

Recent figures suggest that people attending the COT conference (and therefore listening to the Casson lecture) fall into 2 main categories:

- > 70% clinicians (social care and health)
- > 16%-24% education/ research (incl. students)

 Audience figures are not available from the early years of the Casson Memorial lectures



PURPOSE OF THE LECTURE

The speaker has 2 jobs:

- To engage the audience there.
- To fulfil the needs of the paper publication in BJOT that follows the lecture.
- So the tension lies between being a 'performer' and 'in the moment' for the audience, and delivering a text that will also read well and coherently in a journal publication.
- For some professions the tradition of 'reading your paper' is the norm. In OT it is not.



CASSON LECTURERS

- Over the years I have met a good number of the (latter) Casson lecturers.
- Whoever they were, all lecturers considered it a HUGE honour to be selected.
- To a person they were passionate about their chosen topic, and earnest in their endeavour.
- Many were nervous of their obligation and responsibility – would they meet the challenge and earn the respect of their peers.
- Many sought advice from previous Casson lecturers.



"HOW DID I GET HERE....."?

Many Casson Lecturers stressed their ordinariness

- Everyone started as clinical OTs
- Took opportunities
- Told their journey.....

Implication -

- You, too, could be here.....
- You, too, can do what I've done.....



MY CASSON EXPERIENCE - 2004



- I had just become Chair of Council
- I had just got news of my Professorship
 - I was in the middle of a year of cancer treatment



- I played music in the middle of the lecture: Nina Simone - 'I Got Life'.
- Princess Anne was in attendance
- Title 'The Fascination of the Difficult'
 - Complexity, Thinking & Ethics



VISION FOR THE FUTURE?

 Each year - a repetition, to a greater or lesser extent, of the history of Dr Elizabeth Casson.

Method of:

- Professional socialisation,
- Re-stating of the roots of the profession

But is it 'visionary' or inspirational?



INSPIRATIONAL?

- What makes a lecture inspirational?
- And to whom?
- Prof Ann Wilcock (2004) Forward to the publication of Casson Memorial Lectures 1973 – 2004 to mark 50th anniversary of Elizabeth Casson's death:
- "...each of you will find a statement or two more relevant than the rest, or one lecture more attuned to your state of being than others". Pp11.
- Recognise your own potential from the speakers words.


RESONATING THEMES THROUGH THE YEARS

MY FAVOURITE LECTURE



Prof Moya Willson (2002)

- Started with a tale of being evicted from class by a pottery tutor for 'persistently and aggravatingly pretending to be a bee'.
- As well as being Head of OT and physio courses at UEA, she had thrust upon her the role of Head of School of Nursing & Midwifery, much to the disapproval of the nurses and of the Royal College of Midwives - who seemed not at all impressed by her Kennel Club registration as a breeder of gun dogs as a potential qualification for the role!



MY FAVOURITE LECTURE (2)

Willson (2002) says:

"OT is pertinent, surprising, imaginative, but fundamentally practical and profoundly useful".

- She concluded that all Casson Lectures seemed to finish with a couple of items of advice
- Her advice was:
- "The best way to cook asparagus -
- Toss the trimmed spears in olive oil, together with chopped garlic, basil leaves and stoned black olives. Roast in a hottish oven for 10 minutes



IN CONCLUSION.....

- The 'wise owls' provided a snapshot of imperfect vision of the day according to their individual interest and experience.
- Each lecture is a mirror, to some extent, on the personality of the individual - and all the better for that.
- No guarantees for a clear, future vision was apparent, nor an influencing feature for change.
- Inspirational? a very individual perception.
